

## 2022 Independence Day Message for the Diaspora Dr. the Right Honourable Keith Mitchell Prime Minister, Grenada, Carriacou and Petite Martinique On the occasion of Grenada's 48<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Independence Overcoming Our Adversity, Safeguarding Livelihoods, Protecting Our Future February 7, 2022
