JAMAICA60 UK CELEBRATIONS OFFICIALLY LAUNCHED

he celebration of Jamaica Diamond Jubilee had its official launch at a church service on April 24th at the New Testament Church of God in Birmingham. A media launch was held at White City House in London on April 25th. Both events were held in the presence of the Hon. Edmund Bartlett CD, MP, Minister of Tourism and the Hon. Olivia Grange CD, MP, Minister of Culture, Gender, Entertainment and Sport.

A series of activities will be staged across the UK in the next few months in celebration of Jamaica's 60th anniversary of Independence. Many of the activities have been planned to coincide with the staging of the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham, England at which Jamaican athletes will be among the main attractions.

The global celebration of Jamaica 60 is being held under the theme 'Re-igniting a Nation for Greatness'.

RIDDIM MOVES: REGGAE/DANCEHALL EXPRESSION IN BRITAIN

The High Commission hosted Riddim Moves: Reggae/ Dancehall Expression in Britain, a presentation by Dr 'H' Patten, choreographer, dancer and ISRF Independent Fellow, which featured dance performances by Adrian Ashdon "CrazyLegz" Smith and Verona "Ignitiondance" Patterson, as well as an introduction to Sound System Culture by Professor Julian Henriques.

Dr. H argues that Reggae/dancehall's presentation as a vibrant cultural expression is often misunderstood and dismissed as being vulgar and violent. Despite the increasing popularity and use of contemporary urban reggae/dancehall culture globally, both the dance and the sound system culture it emerges from have not gained the recognition they deserve. The event was supported the launch of Dr 'H' Patten's new book, Reading Religion and Spirituality in Jamaican Reggae Dancehall Dance: Spirit Bodies Moving.

The event is supported was the Independent Social Research Foundation (ISRF), Goldsmiths, University of London and IRIE! dance theatre.

REFLECTIONS ON JAMAICA'S INDEPENDENCE: 1962 BY CAROLE FRANCIS-MCGANN CHAIR ST ANN SOCIETY GLOUCESTER

n 1961 as a student at the Kingston technical High school in Kingston, Jamaica, I can't recall paying very much attention to National plans proposed for the following year: namely that of Jamaica becoming an independent nation within the then British commonwealth.

It was not until my activities as a girl guide led me to inclusion in, and preparations for, a variety of functions at my school as well as in the newly built National Stadium where a grand Independence pageant to be held in the presence of HRH the Princess Margaret (representing HM the Queen) was to mark the official opening of the Independence celebrations, and lastly as part of a guard of honour for HRH Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon at an independence banquet held at Kings House, that I became increasingly aware of the momentous event that would take place in August 1962.

Now 60 years later, my memories of that week of celebrations and the changes which would follow in my beloved island, are very mixed. There is certainly pride in the way Jamaica achieved its Independence particularly in the fact that our Nation was born not as a result of bloody warfare or a military coup but as a result of a carefully thought out and well-planned programme of democratic progression agreed on by both political parties who then governed Jamaica as a Colony of Great Britain. I feel great pride in the way Jamaica as a new Nation, conducted itself in the first decade after Independence. That was an era in which the world noted how well we did in so many areas of art, music, sport emerging academic achievement and political leadership.


NURSING STUDENT SHORTLISTED FOR AWARD

MINISTER TUFTON INTRODUCES CODE CARE

The introduction of CODE CARE will seek to do an additional 1,000 surgeries over the next 10 months to clear up most, if not all backlogs caused by the Covid pandemic. To reach that goal, the Ministry of Health Wellness will work with the Diaspora of healthcare professionals who visit Jamaica for special surgery sessions



to provide more efficient arrangements and access to hospital facilities and target elective surgeries with the longest wait.

Those surgeries include for arthroplasty, undescended testis and pterygium. To this end, the Ministry of Health Wellness will work in conjunction with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, overseas missions, and through the National Healthcare Enhancement Foundation.

CARICOM CAUCUS OF HEADS OF MISSION ENGAGEMENTS

A fter two years of virtual meetings due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the CARICOM Caucus of Heads of Mission have resumed face-to-face meetings and activities under the Chairmanship of Her Excellency Therese Rath, High Commissioner for Belize. The Caucus comprises the thirteen (13) CARICOM High Commissioners and Ambassadors who are based in London and accredited to the Court of St. James's. The Caucus meets on a monthly basis, working closely together to collectively advance the Caribbean agenda in the United Kingdom and other countries of interest.





LAUNCH OF IRELAND STRATEGY FOR LATIN AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN

n 22nd February 2022, His Excellency Seth George Ramocan, CD, Jamaican High Commissioner, attended the virtual launch of the Government of Ireland's Strategy for Latin America and the Caribbean. The Strategy is the first ever whole-of-government Strategy for the LAC region, and seeks to strengthen relations in five strategic areas: Enhanced Political Partnership; Stronger, Mutually Beneficial Economic Partnerships; a Collaborative Team-Ireland Approach; Deeper Cultural Links and Ties with the Diaspora; and Deeper Engagement on the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The Launch was led by the Minister of Foreign Affairs and Defence, Simon Coveney T.D., and featured a testimonial from Ms. Yanika Rhule, a Jamaican student studying on scholarship at University College Dublin (UCD) under the Ireland Fellows Programme for SIDS.

JAMAICAN PARLIMENTARIANS VISIT

cross-party delegation of Jamaican parliamentarians visited the UK over the period 22nd to 25th February 2022, to participate in a bilateral Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) programme. The visit built on the previous successful visit of a cross-party CPA UK delegation visit to Jamaica in 2017, and an earlier visit of Jamaican Parliamentarians to Westminster in 2016. The parliamentarians engaged in a four-day programme of interactive sessions, observation of the operations of the UK Parliament, discussions with UK colleagues on issues affecting their respective legislatures (including trade and COVID-19 recovery), and a constituency visit, with the aim of strengthening relations between the Parliaments of Jamaica and the UK.

COMMONWEALTH DAY 2022

is Excellency Seth George Ramocan, CD, Jamaican High Commissioner, attended the annual Commonwealth Day Service at Westminster Abbey on 14th March 2022. The Service was the first in-person gathering of the Commonwealth since the start of the pandemic and reflected on Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee Year with a special focus on the role that service plays in the lives of people and communities across the Commonwealth. The Queen, who is Head of the Commonwealth, was represented at the multi-faith service by The Princess of Wales. Also in attendance were The Duchess of Cornwall, The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge, and Prince Alexandra. Jamaica's flag-bearer for the Service was Ms. Kathryn Williams, an attorney and student at the London School of Economics (LSE).







LAUNCH OF JAMAICA'S CANDIDATURE FOR COMMONWEALTH SECRETARY-GENERAL

n 1st April 2022, Jamaica nominated Senator the Honourable Kamina Johnson Smith, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, for the position of Commonwealth Secretary-General. Within this context, Senator Johnson Smith visited London, the seat of the Commonwealth, to launch and lobby for the candidature over the period 19th to 22nd April 2022.

ROYAL VISIT OF THE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF CAMBRIDGE TO JAMAICA


heir Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge visited Jamaica from 22nd to 24th March 2022 as a part of their wider Caribbean tour to mark Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Royals' schedule took them across the island, including stops at Shortwood Teachers' College in Kingston, the Spanish Town Hospital and the National Police College in St. Catherine, and the Caribbean Infantry Training Centre in St. James. Their Royal Highnesses also met and engaged with Jamaican football stars Leon Bailey and Raheem Sterling during a visit to Trench Town. This aspect of the visit was in recognition of the legacy of Reggae music icon Bob Marley, and involved a visit to Culture Yard, Bob Marley's former home which is now an artistic and educational centre and museum. The Duke and Duchess also paid courtesy calls on His Excellency the Most Honourable Sir Patrick Allen, Governor General, the Most Honourable Andrew Holness, ON, PC, MP, Prime Minister, and Rear Admiral



Antoinette Wemyss-Gorman, Chief of Defence Staff. The Duke and Duchess were hosted by Governor General and Lady Allen at a State Dinner at King's House, and held engagements with the Jamaica Defence Force (JDF) at Up Park Camp prior to leaving the island.

JAMAICAN HIGH COMMISSIONER MEETS UK SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE

n 29th March 2022, His Excellency Seth George Ramocan, CD, Jamaican High Commissioner, paid a courtesy call on Sir Lindsay Hoyle, MP, Speaker of the House of Commons. During their meeting, they discussed Jamaica's road to becoming "the Singapore of the Caribbean" – an important centre for international trade and a logistics hub for sea-faring traffic from Europe, Africa, and Asia to North and South America. High Commissioner Ramocan also spoke to the opportunities which the expanded Panama Canal presented for Jamaica and Kingston in particular, home to the seventh-largest natural harbour in the world.



QUEEN'S COMMONWEALTH RELAY BATON ARRIVES IN JAMAICA

he Jamaica Olympic Association (JOA) welcomed the 16th official Queen's Baton Relay in anticipation of this year's staging of the Commonwealth Games to be held in Birmingham, UK. The Baton arrived in the



island on 15th April 2022, as a part of its journey through 72 Commonwealth nations and territories, prior to the official start of the Games in July 2022. Jamaica was the 51st stop since the relay started on 7th October 2021, with Her Majesty the Queen placing her Message to the Commonwealth into the Baton. In addressing the presentation ceremony held at the UWI Mona Regional Headquarters on 16th April 2022, Senator the Honourable Kamina Johnson Smith, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, said that Jamaicans in the diaspora and otherwise are looking forward to the great achievements of the country's athletes throughout the games. The ceremony was attended also by Mr. Christopher Samuda, President of the JOA, and legendary Jamaican track and field athlete Mr. Donald Quarrie. Over the course of the Baton's 3-day sojourn on the island, it was taken to: the UWI Mona, where it was received with a musical performance by students and carried around the



Usain Bolt Track by athletes; Emancipation Park where members of the community were able to interact with it; Netball House, the official base of Jamaica's netball teams; Spanish Town Cathedral, where the Baton attended a church service; and Donald Quarrie High School, where namesake Donald Quarrie carried the Baton and delivered an inspiring speech to staff and students. The Commonwealth Games is held every four years, with approximately 6600 sportsmen and women participating. Jamaica hosted the Commonwealth Games in 1966, becoming the first and only Caribbean country to have staged the event.



CARIBBEAN NURSES AND MIDWIVES ASSOCIATION (UK) RECEIVED AWARD

he Caribbean Nurses and Midwives Association (UK) received an award for Most Outstanding Pastoral Care in recognition of its work and support of Caribbean heritage nurses in the UK from the Florence Nightingale Foundation and NHS England on the 28th April in London.

The Association was formed in January 2021 to create an environment which will provide support to All Caribbean Nurses and Midwives.

President Ms Paulette Lewis MBE (right with vice president Maurina Baron) said: "Our Vision is to be the Voice of Caribbean Nurses and midwives in driving change towards the improvement of Health & Social Care, Education, workforce and policy development. We have been supporting Caribbean Nurses and Midwives through our Pastoral Care programme".

NEW MAYORS OF JAMAICAN ORIGIN INSTALLED







hree new mayors of Jamaican origin were installed this year. They include Councillors Sandra Samuels, George Cole and Joan Henry.

The 163rd Mayor of Wolverhampton is Councillor Sandra Samuels OBE, who is the city's first Mayor of African-Caribbean heritage in almost 200 years of history, and only its 11th female Mayor.

Cllr Samuels has given more than 40 years of public service as a nurse, NHS manager, trade union official, school governor, community activist, volunteer and city councillor since 2004. She is a former member of the council's cabinet and currently represents the Ettingshall ward of the city.

Cllr Samuels was awarded the OBE by Her Majesty the Queen in 2015 for services to local government and politics. She will be raising money for Wolverhampton's Sickle Cell Care and Activity Centre, Compton Care and The African Caribbean Community Initiative during her time in office.

Councillor George Cole, who represents the city's Western Ward, has become Leicester's new Lord Mayor, and in doing so has also become the city's first Black African Caribbean Lord Mayor.

Born in Kingston, Jamaica, Councillor Cole came to England in 1964, settling in the UK and becoming a British Citizen. He left school aged 15 with no academic qualifications, but relied on his self-belief to improve himself, eventually going on to study for a degree and becoming a principal computer design engineer.

He later progressed to a principal systems design engineer, gaining chartered engineer status, followed by nearly 30 years as a senior university lecturer. During this time, he has also been a radio presenter and producer, has run his own businesses and became a magistrate.

In addition to his role as a city councillor, he has also contributed to the community in many ways as a volunteer, with roles including chair of the African Heritage Alliance, an organisation established to address the inequalities experienced by the African heritage community due to racism.

The new Mayor of Merton is Councillor Joan Henry, who was elected as Mayor for the 2022/23 municipal year by the Council on 25 May.

Councillor Henry was first elected to the council in 2014 and represents Pollards Hill Ward in Mitcham. She will be assisted in her role as Mayor by her consort, Floyd Blake, and her chaplain will be the Reverend Kenneth Scott from the New Testament Church of God Dayspring in Pollards Hill.

WINDRUSH MEMORIAL UNVEILED



embers of the Windrush generation witnessed the unveiling of the National Windrush Monument at London Waterloo Station on Windrush Day, 22 June 2022.

Designed by renowned Jamaican artist Basil Watson, the Monument symbolises the courage, commitment and resilience of the thousands of men, women and children who travelled to the UK to start new lives from 1948 to 1971. It acknowledges and celebrates the Windrush generation's outstanding contribution and has been created as a permanent place of reflection, to foster greater understanding of the generation's talent, hard work and continuing contribution to British society.

The three figures – a man, woman, and child – dressed in their "Sunday best" are climbing a mountain of suitcases together, demonstrating the inseparable bond of the Windrush pioneers and their descendants, and the hopes and aspirations of their generation as they arrive to start new lives in the UK.

WINDRUSH PILLAR UNVEILED AT MILTON KEYNES

igh Commissioner Seth George Ramocan was a special guest at the ceremony at Campbell Park for the unveiling of a pillar to celebrate the contribution of the Windrush Generation in Milton Keynes on Windrush Day, June 22nd . The Friends of the Caribbean organised the event with the Milton Keynes Rose Trust.

Created by internationally renowned artist Gordon Young in 2014, the Milton Keynes Rose is an open-air circle with markings based on the mathematical beauty of a flower. It was developed in partnership by The Parks Trust and the Milton Keynes Cenotaph Trust, with support from Milton Keynes Council.

A Windrush Cricket Family Fun Day took place earlier in the month to raise funds for the pillar. Other special guests at



the event included Jamaican representatives from the Home Office, the Mayor of Milton Keynes and the Lord Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire.
